

Keith Taylor of Creston, BC. returned to complete research confirming that his grandmother. Mrs. David Taylor (Elizabeth nee Spence), is buried in the Bresaylor Cemetery. He had a marker placed on her grave. Bill and Elaine Walls dropped by the Museum while in the area attending a Willett family reunion held at the old Grand Cheviot School.

We've one last quote from Jean Petty who passed away in her 94th year: "Many thanks for helping me keep in touch with Bresaylor and Paynton folk by sending man the Newsletter. VE DAY - 60 YEARS SINCE THE END OF WORLD WAR TWO

The number of Canadians who served overseas in the Second World War is shrinking each year. Their sacrifice should never be forgotten. We pay tribute to all by acknowledging the recollections of the late Doug Dobie as included in the Bresaylor history book. Too long to include here, we refer the reader to page 460. Since we crossed the Rhine on the 27th March, 1945 in the wake of the British 2nd Army and the 9th Brigade of our own 3rd Division, the going had been fairly tough and fatiguing. The first of April, I remember it well because it was also Easter Sunday, we took up the chase of the German army again. The forward battalion had by this time lost contact with the enemy and then it came around to being our (Regina's) turn to lead the

We took off in carriers and trucks at noon and that evening we crossed the German frontier into Holland again. We knew it immediately, for every house had a huge Dutch flag flying from a window and all the kids were mobbing us for chocolate and gum. It was gettin on toward dusk when the advance halted for supper. Supper in name only because it was hard-tack and "bully". We stopped for half an hour and then loaded up and pushed on again. The night was pretty chilly too, but we weren't worried about that for we had other things to worry about ... cont'd. p. 460 history book ->

BRESAYLOR CEMETERY UPDATE

Some of you will recall that back in 1987 the late Pheame Tokle started compiling a list of persons buried in unmarked graves in the Bresaylor Cemetery. We have endeavored to complete that list. Also, we hoped that families would consider marking the graves of known relatives. We realise that is not always possible, that markers are quite expensive. So it is nice to see that markers were taken care of for three of the original Bresaylor Settlement families. The McDonald family added names to the large stone already in place for Philip McDonald. Alan Kissack placed markers on the graves of his grandparents, Peter and Catherine Taylor. And just last summer D. Keith Taylor added a marker for his grandmother, Elizabeth (Spence) Taylor, wife of David Taylor. It took a bit of research to determine that Elizabeth was indeed buried in the Bresaylor Cemetery.

Now, we are ready to place the remaining names on a common marker. Likely granite suspended from a metal frame support, we are discussing the possibilities with Rose City Monuments of Cut Knife. We should be able to have the marker in place later this summer.

Below is a list of all persons that we are quite sure are buried in the cemetery, but in unmarked graves. A couple are questionable – they may be there (*). We are asking those of you who might remember to please let us know if you think any of these people may NOT be buried there. Remember, these are names of the unmarked graves only. 



Minute Book of the Paynton "Churchill Vlictory Club" (1947-51) was brought to the Museum from Bertha's house by Ruth Voodsworth. I understand the CVC was one of many women's roups helping to raise money not only for the war effort, but also to send aid to Britain in the wake of WW2, when she was drained of resources and her people suffering deprivations. It would be interesting to hear from anyone who might have recollections about such "victory" clubs. Another interesting addition to the Museum collection was brought in by Ed and Margaret Murray: - that is, the Minute Book, Accounts, correspondence etc. - Records from Federal School. We now have the record books from three schools in our area - those of #111, and Arbor Hill as well. It's too much to hope that any from Battlebank would surface?

"HEADINGLEY, Pioneers, Past & Present" by Murray Peterson and Georgia Anderson Taillieu. 308 pp. (Hard Cover \$65. + \$8. mailing = \$73. order from Jean Ammeter, 5765 Portage Ave., Headingley, MB, R4H-1E7).

Headingley is that area along the Assiniboine River from whence came the first Bresaylor Settlers - the Bremners, Sayers, Taylors and others. Now surrounded by greater Winnipeg, it retains its own identity and its Historical Society assures a proud sense of its past. Much credit is given to local historian, Jean Ammeter, and certainly many of the Endnotes refer to her files. Jean has been in touch with us for many years. Being a local history book, the time period and potential subject matter for such a project would be daunting. The writers have chosen to be selective about who, what, and how much is covered in the main text and to make extensive reference to sources. They do not report on family members who left Headingley. So, reference only is made to the Bresaylor families while naturally Honourable John Taylor (brother of the Bresaylor Taylors) and his descendants are given wide coverage. I found much of interest in the book photos, samples of land transfers, maps etc - worthwhile to have at hand. And there are those extensive endnotes.

(The Museum purchases a copy of "Headingley" for our archives. Ask to have a look if you are interested.)
