



Three men, with close ties to the history of Battleford, have gone from us during this past year - Doug Light, David Shury and Ross Innes. They were all supporters of Bresaylor Heritage too.

David Shury, whose book "Baseball Diamonds" we have in our Gift Shop, established the Baseball Hall of Fame in Battleford. Jane, his wife of 52 years, intends to carry on and expand that museum.


