Where are the Artifacts? Ross innes, of the Battlefords North-West Historical Society, is concerned about the fate of artifacts once housed at Fort Battleford (some 20,000 in all), many collected by his father, the late Campbell Innes. Some of the items were from original Bresaylor Settlers. The intention was that they remain in the Fort for the enjoyment of future generations. When the Federal Government took over Fort Battleford the artifacts started to disappear. Now Ross Innes and Don Light, both authorities on Battleford and area history, are trying to contact families whose ancestors contributed artifacts. They want to put pressure on the government to prove that the items are safely stored as claimed. Or otherwise explain what became of them.
